Requirements: The Journey Fellowship for Students 2009 Schedule

Fellows *must* attend personal and career development meetings including the following:

1. **February 9:** Applications Due
2. **February 16:** Students Notified
3. **March:** Campus-based service activity
4. **March 27-29:** Discovery Retreat
5. **April :** Campus-based service activity
6. **April 18:** Full-day internship exploration
7. **May - July:** Complete internships
8. **June 16:** Youth Work 1.0 Training
9. **August 4-6, :** Celebration/Closing retreat

While The Journey is unable to offer course credit directly for being a Journey Fellow, we will work with students to identify opportunities to receive course credit for your participation in the program.

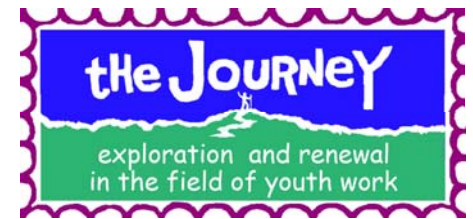

- be inspired to consider what they can do to positively impact the lives of young people

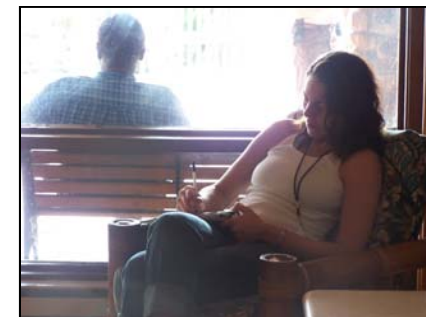
The fellowship is about helping students from diverse academic disciplines to reflect on who they are while exploring the various career opportunities serving young people.
